OUR DISTRICT, SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY

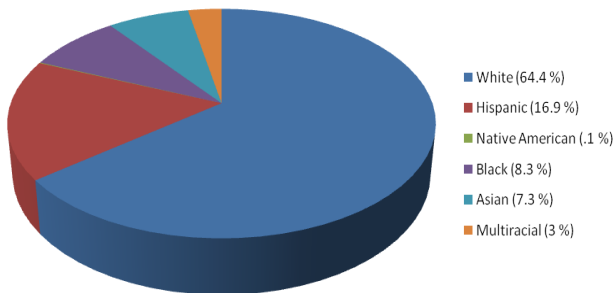
Plainfield Community Consolidated School District 202 is a creative, proactive school system in the southwest Chicago suburbs, dedicated to ensuring that all students learn, achieve and grow to their maximum potential.

District 202 serves about 30,711 students from a 64-square mile area encompassing all or parts of Bolingbrook, Crest Hill, Joliet, Lockport, Naperville, Plainfield, Romeoville and unincorporated Will and Kendall counties. In 2010-11 District 202 was the fifth largest public school system in Illinois.

Plainfield North High School opened its doors in August of 2005. The school was the third high school in Plainfield School District 202 with a minimal faculty/staff of 130 and an enrollment of freshmen and sophomores totaling 1080. PNHS has a diverse population.

GRADING PROCEDURES

Semester grades are cumulative, and progress reports are distributed every six weeks. Grades are computed in the following manner:

- A = Outstanding academic achievement
- B = Above-average academic achievement
- C = Average academic achievement
- D = Below-average academic achievement (minimum passing grade for which high school credit is granted)
- F = Unsatisfactory academic achievement. No credit is given for courses in which a student has earned this grade.
- M = An incomplete semester grade. This grade is given only to students who have had extensive absences due to hospitalization, illness or other extreme circumstances. Incomplete semester grades will convert to an "F" if they are not made up within the subsequent six-week period.
- WP = Withdrawal from a course without a grade penalty. This mark will not affect a student's grade point average or class rank.
- WF = Withdrawal from a course with a grade penalty. This grade is considered an "F" when calculating a student's grade point average or class rank.

The following grading scale is a guideline used by teachers:

A = 90-100 B = 80-89 C = 70-79 D = 60-69 F = 0-59

DUAL CREDIT

District 202 has entered into a cooperative agreement with Joliet Junior College (JJC) to offer dual credit coursework at each of its high schools. Students who complete courses offered through this agreement receive both high school credit toward graduation and college credit. The current dual credit offerings include Rhetoric, Keyboarding and numerous vocational course options.

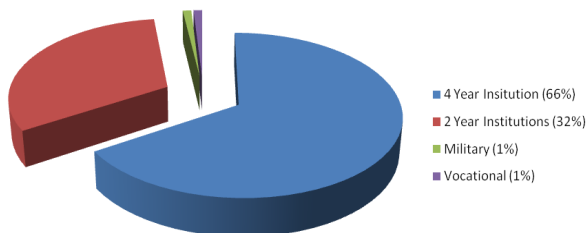
HONOR ROLL

Class of 2011 reporting post high school

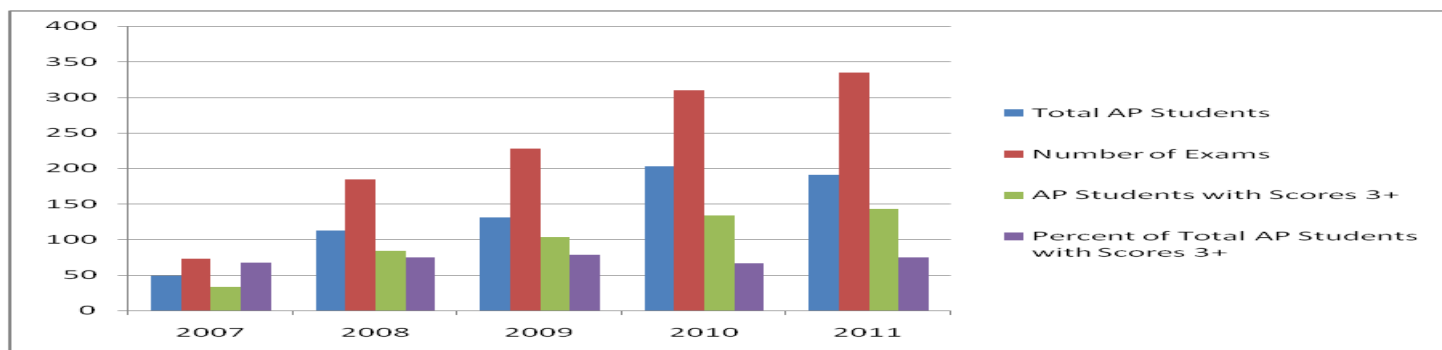
